# PROJECT UPDATES

#### 4th National Summit on World NO Tobacco Day 2024 (Virtual)

The Resource Centre for Tobacco Control (RCTC) under the Department of Community Medicine & School of Public Health, PGIMER, Chandigarh, supported by Vital Strategies, hosted the 4th National Summit on World No Tobacco Day on May 28, 2024, via virtual mode. The theme for this year was "Protecting Children from Tobacco Industry Interference." The summit featured prominent dignitaries from national and state ministerial offices, as well as various organizations committed to a tobacco-free world. The event saw significant engagement, with over 1300 registrations from India and countries such as the UAE, Ethiopia, Iraq, Kenya, Nepal, Nigeria, Pakistan, Paraguay, Saudi Arabia, South Sudan, Sri Lanka, and Zambia. The summit's primary focus was encouraging youth to avoid tobacco and related products, understanding the tobacco industry's tactics, and reinforcing the implementation of the National Tobacco Control Programme. The event included four sessions: two plenary sessions and two panel discussions. Participants ranged from policymakers and advocates to doctors, researchers, and civil society groups took part.



#### Expert talk to explore the potential models for tobacco taxation:

An online meeting was held on May 5th, 2024, to discuss potential models for research in tobacco taxation. The one-hour session featured distinguished experts, including Dr. Sonu Goel, Director of RCTC, Dr. Tony Blakley, Dr. Driss Ait Ouakrim, Dr. Priyobrat Rajkhowa, and Dr. Nirmal Singh. The primary focus was evaluating various taxation models implemented globally, examining their impact on tobacco consumption, public health, and economic outcomes. Discussions emphasized the importance of behavioural insights, effective tax policies, and data-driven decision-making. The experts underscored the need for interdisciplinary research and collaborative efforts to refine these models. The meeting concluded with an agreement to continue this collaborative approach, scheduling follow-up sessions to develop actionable research agendas further.

#### World No Tobacco Day Competitions on Slogans writing, Poster making, and videography



To generate mass awareness, a national-level competition for poster making, slogan writing, and videography was organized in celebration of World No Tobacco Day 2024. Participants from across India enthusiastically joined the event, channelling their creativity and dedication towards the cause of tobacco cessation. The competition aimed to highlight the dangers of tobacco use and the importance of quitting through impactful visual and written messages. Submissions showcased a wide array of talents, with entries emphasizing the critical health risks associated with tobacco and advocating for a tobacco-free lifestyle. Winners were awarded prizes for their exceptional works, which stood out for their originality and compelling delivery of the World No Tobacco Day theme. This event not only honoured the creative efforts of the participants but also significantly contributed to spreading vital anti-tobacco messages to a broad audience, reinforcing the importance of collective action and public health awareness.

#### **Induction Training Program**

On May 10, 2024, an induction training program for newly joined project staff was held, featuring esteemed speakers including Dr. Sonu Goel, Professor, Department of Community Medicine and School of Public Health, PGIMER, Chandigarh; Dr. Rana J Singh, Director of Tobacco Control for South-East Asia, Vital Strategies, New Delhi; Dr. Rakesh Gupta, President, Rajasthan Cancer Foundation and SIPHER; Dr. Gopal Chauhan, State Nodal Officer, Himachal Pradesh; Ms. Opinder Preet Kaur Gill, Director of Programs, Generation Saviour Association (GSA); Dr. Shivam Kapoor, Technical Advisor for STOP India and Global Monitoring, Vital Strategies; and Mr. Rajeev Kumar, Project Coordinator, Department of Community Medicine and School of Public Health, PGIMER, Chandigarh.



New team members from RCTC, PGIMER, and GSA attended the event. The program aimed to provide these recruits with comprehensive knowledge and insights necessary for addressing tobacco-related issues effectively. Key topics covered included the fundamentals of tobacco control—such as epidemiology, MPOWER, Cigarettes and Other Tobacco Products Act (COTPA), and National Tobacco Control Programme (NTCP), tobacco industry interference, an introduction to tobacco taxation, and strategies for achieving the tobacco endgame. This training marked a significant step in fostering a collaborative tobacco control and prevention approach, establishing a solid foundation for future initiatives.





## **WORLD NO TOBACCO DAY 2024**

Theme: Protecting children from tobacco industry interference

#### WHO, World No Tobacco Day 2024 Awards

The World Health Organization (WHO) commemorated World No Tobacco Day and honours exceptional contributions to tobacco control through its prestigious awards. In 2024, six institutions received this recognition: the Gambia Revenue Authority, Republic of the Gambia; Tobacco Abstinence Club, Federal Republic of Nigeria; National Commission for the Implementation of the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control, Brazil; Ministry of Health, Ukraine; Odisha State Tobacco Control Cell, Republic of India; and Hangzhou Municipal People's Government, People's Republic of China. Additionally, in India, the WHO Regional Director's Special Recognition Award was presented to Dr. Mir Mushtaq Ahmad, Nodal Officer Kashmir, National Tobacco Control Program, and Generation Saviour Association, Punjab, India. These awards highlight global efforts to combat tobacco use and promote public health.



#### MoHFW, Govt of India, launches tobacco-free educational institutions campaign

As part of the National Tobacco Control Programme, the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India, has initiated the Tobacco Free Educational Institutions (ToFEI) campaign. It has outlined nine activities for educational institutions to transform them into tobacco-free zones. The key activities include: placing 'Tobacco Free Premise' and 'Smoke-Free Area' signage, displaying "Tobacco Free Education Institution" signage, ensuring no evidence of tobacco use, displaying awareness materials, organizing tobacco control activities, nominating 'Tobacco Monitors', enforcing no tobacco use through a code of conduct, marking a 100-yard no-tobacco zone, and self-evaluating ToFEI implementation for compliance awards.

## State-wise Efforts on World No Tobacco Day, 2024

#### All India Institutes of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) Bathinda

AllMS Bathinda observed World No Tobacco Day 2024 with the theme "Protecting Children from Tobacco Industry Interference" from 29-31 May. Activities included a poster and slogan competition for MBBS and nursing students, a health check-up camp for non-medical staff screening 62 beneficiaries, and a health awareness talk on tobacco's effects and cessation. Students and beneficiaries took a no-tobacco pledge, emphasizing tobacco-free environments. Additionally, the Central Library released a special issue on tobacco-related news. These efforts aimed to educate, promote cessation, and safeguard against tobacco industry influences.



# Adesh Institute of Medical Sciences & Research (AIMSR), Bathinda

The World No Tobacco Day 2024 at AIMSR, Bathinda, was marked by a series of activities aligned with the theme "Protecting Children from Tobacco Industry Interference." Activities commenced with an inception meeting of selected medical colleges on

These sessions, addressing mothers and various hospital workers, highlighted this year's theme of protecting children from Tobacco Industry Interference (TII). #### AIIMS, Deoghar

The institute also began a research project examining the impact of secondhand tobacco smoke on lactating mothers. Additionally, AllMS Kalyani launched an Al-enabled treatment package for alcohol and nicotine use disorders, known as E-DOSTHI. Their ongoing Tobacco Control Action Program aims to create tobacco-free environments through extensive educational campaigns and community outreach efforts. These initiatives collectively aim to reduce tobacco-related health risks and promote healthier lifestyles.

#### **AIIMS Patna**

A total of 587 beneficiaries, including faculty, resident doctors, interns, paramedical staff, patients, and bus drivers, participated. The events covered topics on tobacco's impact, cessation strategies, and screening, engaging participants through lectures, discussions, skits, and interactive sessions.

#### Jajati Keshari Medical College, Jajpur

As part of the consortium of Medical Colleges aiming for a tobacco-free India, several activities were conducted for World No Tobacco Day 2024 by the Department of Community Medicine. On June 30th, a "No Tobacco" pledge was taken at CDMO Jajpur office with 12 participants, including the



Chief District Medical Officer. The same day, 35 security guards and sanitary workers received training at the District Training Unit. #### WHO reports progress in the fight against tobacco epidemic

The WHO reports a significant rise in the adoption of tobacco control measures, with 5.3 billion people now covered by at least one MPOWER measure, up from 1 billion in 2007. These measures include monitoring, protection from smoke, quitting support, health warnings, advertising bans, and taxation. Despite progress, raising tobacco taxes remains slow, with 49 countries yet to adopt any MPOWER measures. Additionally, 84 countries lack regulations for electronic nicotine delivery systems, posing a threat to youth. WHO urges stricter regulations to prevent nicotine addiction among children and protect public health.

#### **Vietnam Wants to Raise Tobacco Taxes**

Vietnam's finance ministry plans to raise the excise duty on cigarettes and add an absolute rate per pack, reports Tuoi Tre News. Currently, the excise duty is 75% of the factory price but only 38.8% of the retail



price, lower than Singapore and Thailand. To protect public health, the ministry proposes two solutions. The first is to keep the 75% excise tax unchanged in 2026, adding VND2,000 (\$0.07) per pack, and increasing by VND2,000 annually until it reaches VND10,000 in 2030. The second option is to add VND5,000 per pack in 2026, increasing by VND1,000 annually until it reaches VND10,000 in 2030. Vietnam has one of the highest smoking prevalences, with over 42% of adults smoking.

#### New Zealand Halves heated-tobacco products (HTPs) Taxes

New Zealand has halved taxes on HTPs to encourage smokers to switch to less risky alternatives. Customs Minister Casey Costello hopes the tax cut will make HTPs more attractive and aid smoking cessation. Critics argue the government has yielded to tobacco lobbying. In 2018, Philip Morris suggested lower taxes for HTPs to the Tax Working Group.

Earlier this year, the government scrapped a generational tobacco ban and appears open to industry-backed harm reduction measures. Costello is also considering legalizing oral nicotine products like snus and pouches, despite Health Ministry reservations about their effectiveness and potential addiction risks.

British American Tobacco (BAT), which owns nicotine pouch brands, has lobbied for their legalization, stating that their inclusion in the regulatory framework would advance the Smoke-Free 2025 goals.

#### **Romania Restricts ENDS Promotions**

Romania has tightened advertising restrictions on electronic nicotine devices and modern oral products, reports Xinhua. President Klaus Iohannis signed new legislation on July 19, banning explicit ads for e-cigarettes, heat-not-burn products, and nicotine pouches on radio, TV, and public transportation tickets. Ads are also prohibited within 200 meters of educational and healthcare institutions and in publications and theaters targeting minors.

#### Pakistan Tobacco Co. (PTC) Risks Losing Sudan Small-Pack Order



The Business Recorder reports that Pakistan Tobacco Co. (PTC) may lose a significant \$20.5 million cigarette order from Sudan if the health ministry delays the necessary regulatory approval. While Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif approved an exemption for small-pack exports, the health ministry has not issued the required amendment.

Sudan, needing the cigarettes in 10-stick packets, is considering other suppliers like Bangladesh and Indonesia due to the delay. PTC, which has earned \$156 million in exports since 2019, paid PKR148 billion in taxes last fiscal year and targets \$60 million in exports next year. A similar delay cost PTC a Gulf order in 2019.

#### **Cooks Islands Ban Vape Trade**

The Cook Islands has enacted the Tobacco Products Control Amendment Act 2024, prohibiting the manufacture, importation, sale, distribution, and advertising of e-cigarettes. The Act also raises the legal age for purchasing tobacco from 18 to 21 and bans smoking in most public places.

Retailers must obtain permits to sell tobacco; 37 of 43 applications have been approved. Authorized sales begin on August 1, 2024. Internet sales are restricted to business-to-business transactions. Violators face fines up to \$10,000 or three months in prison. Tobacco product displays are also banned.

# Tackling oral cancer: India's struggle with tobacco chewing (01 May 2024, TOI)

The World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that tobacco consumption, including chewing, is responsible for over 90 percent of mouth cancer cases in India. Tobacco chewing poses severe health risks, with oral cancer being the most devastating consequence. The habit exposes users to a potential mix of carcinogens, that lead to the development of malignant tumors in the mouth, throat, and surrounding areas. Apart from cancer, chewing tobacco increases the risk of developing other oral health problems such as gum diseases, tooth decay, and leukoplakia.

#### Stopping smokeless tobacco could save India, Bangladesh, and Pakistan \$23bn in lifetime healthcare costs (08 May 2024, Brunel University London)



If India, Bangladesh, and Pakistan's policies on the use of smokeless tobacco stay as they are now, then more than \$23 billion will be spent on healthcare costs across the lifetime of consumers in the three countries, with the biggest health impacts falling on young people who haven't yet taken up the habit. These are headline findings from health economists from Brunel University London, UK, who, together with researchers from South Asia and the University of York, ran the first-ever study of the lifetime impact of smokeless tobacco use on the health, quality of life, and healthcare costs of South Asians – sorted according to country, age group and sex.

# Tobacco Ban: Delhi High Court Asks Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) To Decide on Issue Expeditiously (22, March 2024)

A PIL was filed by the president of the Bhartiya Samriddhi Kalyan Party, Sheetal Dhariwal in the high court to seek a ban of various Gutka and pan masala brands for non-compliance with the Regulation 2.3.4 of the FSSAI Regulations, 2011 which prohibits the sale, manufacture, storage, and distribution of any food products which contains tobacco and nicotine as ingredients. The high court observed that the petitioners had not moved any other authority before approaching it, and disposed of the petition. However, the high court asked the FSSAI to consider the petition in court as a representation and decide on it expeditiously.

#### No change in tax on tobacco: ITC shares roar with gains of over 4% after union budget

This omission has raised business expectations for tobacco companies, particularly ITC (formerly Indian Tobacco Company). Following the budget announcement, ITC's shares listed on the NSE surged, gaining over 4 percent during the trading session.

# Palike licence is a must to sell tobacco items in Bangaluru



Bengaluru is moving to regulate tobacco sales and discourage smoking. Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) has unveiled a new set of licensing rules for tobacco vendors in the city. The initiative was recently approved by BBMP administrator SR Umashankar. Under the regulations, all tobacco vendors will be required to obtain a license to sell their products. Failure to comply could result in fines, with violators facing a Rs 5,000 penalty and an additional Rs 100 per day for continued non-compliance.
